MINUTES OF THE 113TH ANNUAL MEETING

St. Mark's Episcopal Church Annual Meeting January 29, 2023

Meeting called to order at 9:02 AM by Rev. Keith Yamamoto.

Current vestry members were introduced including Carol Morgan, continuing on as Sr. Warden, Kimberly Cortner, Karin Brown, Sharon Muehlbacher, Nick Adams, Dean Billman, Barbara Nalbach, and Marcia Godwin. Derek May, retiring as treasurer, and Vicki Levario, retiring as vestry clerk, were introduced. Kathryn Barbour was introduced as the new vestry clerk. Ken Drew introduced as the new treasurer.

Vicki Levario appointed as clerk for the annual meeting.

Quorum for the meeting was declared. Motion made to dispense the reading of the previous year's minutes – M/S/A.

Senior warden report given by Carol Morgan. Highlights of 2022 were reported (see attached).

Junior warden report given by Kimberly Cortner reporting on the search for the music director search, upcoming partnership with the Kaleidoscope Institute, (see attached).

Finance report given by Marcia Godwin, chairperson of the Finance Committee. Overall status of the financial condition of the church was discussed including the Federal programs now available for churches.

Rector's report was given by Rev. Keith Yamamoto. The transition of St. Mark's Preschool to Head Start was explained. The partnership with the County of San Bernardino has taken longer than expected. The remodeling/renovations necessary for Head Start using the facilities was explained. New revenue streams are being explored by a designated taskforce to support the church financially. Head Start is not a replacement of our preschool but rather a new outreach being established. St. Mark's Preschool will close January 31, 2023 (see attached for further information).

Election of new vestry members: Gail Dean and Kathy Osterkamp were elected as new vestry members. Kathy Walker, candidate for convention delegate elected. M/S/A

Remembering those who have been baptized and have passed in the previous year was led by Rev. Sally Monastiere, Discerner Rodney Hume-Dawson and the Daughters of the King.

CONVENTION DELEGATE REPORT 2023

128th Annual Meeting of the Episcopal Diocese of Los Angeles

The Theme of this year's Convention was "Love in Action". The speakers and committees addressed applications of the theme to climate change, social justice, affordable housing, finance, and much more.

We met in Riverside again this year, such a welcoming town. Merchants in the downtown area asked if we were with the convention. It is always good shopping and eating in Riverside, of course including the exhibit hall with all of the vendors.

Bishop Taylor's address "We are woke and proud of it." "Being woke can take many forms, whether we are woke to the condition of people different from us or the danger posed by climate change to the Creation that people of all conditions share." He addressed the ongoing wars in Israel-Palestine, Ukraine, affordable housing and much more. Through the efforts of many people, including Bishop Taylor, St. James' Church in Newport Beach was reinstated to full parish status.

Canon to the Ordinary the Rev. Melissa McCarthy spoke about climate change and the efforts of the diocese to achieve carbon neutrality by 2030. "The diocese has begun an environmental reformation."

Dr. Lucy Jones, the one person we turn to after an earthquake, is the Senior Warden at St. James's Church in South Pasadena and was one of the speakers. She started out by quoting Robin Williams about all the reasons to be an Episcopalian, "we don't handle snakes, we don't check our brains at the door and we get free wine and get to believe in dinosaurs." She said God chose evolution to create us. Dr. Jones sermon about was about climate change and what our world will look like in the future if we don't do something about it now. "If left unchecked, climate change really will destroy the world. Significant parts of our world will be too hot to sustain agriculture. A billion people would need to migrate in order to find food."

The panel on Multicultural and African Descent Ministries discussed the challenges and joys of their ministries. Rev. Al Rodriguez, Rev. Fennie Hsin-Fen Chang, Rev. Bradley Hauff and the Rev. Ron Byrd were the participants.

Dr. Robert Ross was the Margaret Parker Lecturer. Dr. Ross is the recently-retired president and chief executive officer of The California Endowment, a private statewide foundation established in 1996 to address the health needs of Californians. He also chaired the Los Angeles County Task Force on Alternative to Incarceration "developing a roadmap for the county to reform criminal justice system."

Rev. Michael Bell spoke at a workshop and to the general assembly about affordable housing and where in the diocese it is being done. So many churches in our area are either completing building or in the beginning phases of construction.

St. Stephen's Hollywood has launched a Firefly electrician training program for young women. It is a two year program meeting monthly. The program is funded by a grant from the Los Angeles Girl's Friendly Society.

Resolutions: All of the Resolutions passed.

- 1. To form a companion relationship with the Diocese of Taiwan.
- 2. To adopt the General Convention Resolution 80th anniversary program honoring Florence Li Tim-Oi in a diocesan wide celebration. She was the first woman priest in the Anglican Communion.
- 3. To ask the General Convention that the Philadelphia Eleven be added to the Lesser Feasts & Fast Calendar of the church year.
- 4. To adopt that the First Sunday in Advent be established as Holy Family Services, Adoption & Foster Care Sunday.

And of course the budget was presented by Canon Andy Tomat, available on line at www.diocesela.org/convention/budget

SENIOR WARDEN'S REPORT

Last year, St. Mark's continued to make a strong return after the challenges of the pandemic. You can find full reports from various parish groups in the Annual Report. I offer some highlights here.

A major focus this year was the work of our finance team, which made incredible strides in clarifying, simplifying, and cleaning up our financial processes. They also worked to reduce our expenses for everything from photocopiers to telephones.

Leaders of guilds, taskforces, committees, work groups, and the Vestry participated in the Kaleidoscope Institute's series where we contemplated the use and flow of our Holy Currencies of Time, Place, Leadership, Relationship, Wellness, Truth, and Treasure. As a result of this work, two new ministries, Youth for Christ and Venue Rentals, were "incubated". Other ministries were able to refocus their work to align with our mission.

Several parishioners attended the annual Diocesan Convention in Riverside to represent our parish as delegates and as exhibitors of diocesan organizations.

Parishioners attended the diocesan Creation Care Summit at St. Paul's Commons and brought back ideas for creative ways to become a stronger advocate for saving our planet.

Dine-out fundraisers continued to bring in money to support our fun fellowship events. We gave our cooks the night off and supported St. Mark's at the same time.

We hosted Bishop Franklin Brookhart, who officiated at a baptism, three confirmations, and one reception. His visit coincided with our St. Nicholas Brunch. I think the bishop might have thought we threw that wonderful party just for him!

We held our first Ministry Leaders' Forum to discuss the wellness of our leaders as well as Sabbath time and succession planning in our ministries. We need to care for our ministry leaders since they do so much for us.

We held two Vestry Q&A forums to listen to concerns from the congregation and to give updates on current issues in the parish. These opportunities for two-way communication are essential for maintaining transparency between the vestry and parishioners.

A venue rental taskforce was started to make our beautiful facilities available for rent to the community for special events such as weddings, parties, and meetings. We hope to be able to generate additional revenue for the parish while serving our neighbors. If you know someone who would like to rent a room, please contact the office.

We established a parish master calendar in our Breeze church management system. All church events and facility rentals will be posted in Breeze under the Events tab. If you want to schedule a meeting or an event, check the calendar in Breeze first for the availability of your selected room.

Sadly, St. Mark's Preschool closed last year after 60 years of service to our community. But, happily, the staff from the preschool opened a new school at Angels Academy in Upland. We are so glad the legacy of our preschool continues.

It has been my honor and pleasure to serve St. Mark's as Senior Warden for the last two years. I can honestly say that our parish has a strong, talented, and caring vestry and Rector who have made important and challenging decisions to further the mission of our beloved parish. I thank all the guild, committee, and taskforce members who have been the glue that keeps all the parts of St. Mark's running smoothly.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

The Buildings and Grounds Committee held meetings on zoom throughout the year on the second Tuesday of each month at 11:00 a.m. The committee is responsible for the management and maintenance of the church property, as well as the maintenance of the rectory.

Buildings and Grounds projects completed this year include:

- The complete replacement of piping in the rectory.
- The replacement of the water main from the street to the rectory.
- Clean-up of the water damage in Room 29, including the removal of carpet, drywall, and scrapping of bricks. Air samples were taken to confirm that there are no hazardous levels of mold in Rooms 29 and 30, and the storage room behind them. The library ramp will be removed early this year. This is necessary because of the condition of the ramp, but it will also help to provide clarity on the source of leakage into the building.

The Buildings and Grounds Committee has provided input and support for the continued discussions with the County of San Bernardino for Head Start. The Committee is also working with the Senior Warden, Carol Morgan, to find alternate revenue streams for the church. Our large property allows this group to consider many options. Community outreach has continued this year with Al-Anon and Compulsive Eaters Anonymous meeting weekly in Room 16.

The Red Cross continues with its blood drives on campus. Thank you to all of our volunteers who helped with those events.

A special thank you to the Buildings and Grounds Committee who work so hard to manage and maintain our beautiful campus: Dale Biggs, Kathy Walker, Kate Flannery, Chris Watson, and Paul Stapp.

Many of the Trunk or Treaters enjoyed dancing to the sounds provided by DJ Professor. Fulfilling St. Mark's Mission Statement as a community of grace, hot dogs, chips and water were handed out to the Trunk or Treaters free of charge. It was St.

Mark's gift to the community. All the food/drink items were donated by St. Mark's Parishioners.

As winter approached, **December** found the Fellowship Ministry playing a crucial role in decorating the Parish Hall for the combined Bishop/Santa Visit and the St. Nicholas Catered Brunch. This event infused the space with a winter wonderland theme, a snow

globe backdrop, and a space for children to visit with Santa. The hall was filled with fellowship and holiday cheer.

The Brunch, catered by California Cook Out, was made possible with donations and and Apple and Dine Out fundraisers.

Decorations, drinks, and desserts were contributed by St. Mark's parishioners. Concluding the year, the Fellowship Ministry coordinated the Advent Soup Supper for the Deanery in December. Parishioners donated soups, salad, bread, and desserts, providing an opportunity to bring the community together in reflection and anticipation of the Christmas season.

In summary, the Fellowship Ministry at St. Mark's Episcopal Church has been instrumental in orchestrating a diverse array of events throughout the year, fostering fellowship, celebration, and community engagement. The commitment and creativity of the ministry members have undoubtedly contributed to the vibrant and welcoming atmosphere that defines our church community. However, as we look forward, there is a need to focus on recruiting and retaining new ministers to ensure the continuation of these exceptional events

FINANCE

We appreciate our parishioners for their financial commitment to St. Mark's. The Breeze database has improved our ability to be compile and share information. We have 57 pledges for the operating fund so far -- average of \$3,600 per household. Typically, two-thirds of operating income comes from pledgers. We also have 17 pledges for the building fund and 6 for other programs. We will be sharing additional information during the annual meeting. Thank you for participating in our stewardship campaign! We accept pledges and revised pledges at any time.

The Vestry, Finance Committee, Stewardship Committee, Building and Grounds Committee, and others have devoted countless hours to reorganizing our finances. We are prayerfully making progress towards a sustainable and growing St. Mark's. We had to draw down savings by about \$125,000 in 2023. We have a projected deficit in the \$100,000 range for 2024, which can only be covered by receiving Employee Retention Credit funds. We are awaiting the receipt of funds from the IRS and have been working with our payroll provider to fully recoup all the funds for which we are eligible. The 2024 budget includes both cost savings from restructuring and increases due to inflation.

We have had steady financial support while also facing challenges with the closure of our school and preschool. We continue to give thanks for the generous donations for paying off our building loan in 2022 and saving \$85,000 per year in loan payments. Our negotiations with Head Start recently resumed and we are exploring opportunities for electric vehicle charging/solar installation and special event rentals. These efforts are complicated and take time to come to fruition.

Key items for this year included:

• The difficult closure of our preschool at the end of January. Several teachers have opened Angel's Academy at St. George's Antiochian Orthodox Church.

- Replacement of rectory plumbing
- Implementation of no-fee online giving through Zelle
- Hiring of a new music director
- Submittal of a grant application to the diocese for some of the costs related to water intrusion in the lower level of the library
- Negotiations with San Bernardino County Real Estate Services
- Increased dine-out fundraisers (thanks to Stewardship Committee)
- Review and restructuring of services. One of our two copier leases has now expired.

While my term on vestry is over, I will be continuing to work with Rose and Ken to complete restructuring and updating our financial practices. This has been difficult but necessary work. Thank you for your support of our efforts.

There are some bills pending and it is prudent to keep a reserve in case of emergencies.

Stewardship

The St. Mark's Stewardship Committee works to encourage parishioners to share their treasure and talent with our church community. This year, our Rooted in Abundance pledge campaign reminded us that we indeed have more than enough and when we share what we have, our entire community benefits. We have received a total of 56 pledges totaling \$233,450, down from last year's total of 65 pledges totaling \$249,103. Our goals for 2024 include working to educate church members on the importance of pledging a donation and how each pledge affects our annual budget, as well as continuing to organize a variety of fundraising activities that our members enjoy.

WORSHIP

We opened the year with relaxed recommendations for corporate worship. Masking was still strongly encouraged by those serving people face-to-face in close proximity—for example, hospitality hosts, ushers, greeters, Sunday School teachers, and Eucharistic ministers. Unvaccinated persons and those who are immunocompromised were especially encouraged to wear masks indoors, particularly when in small rooms with minimal air circulation.

There was no service at St. Mark's on Strove Tuesday (Feb 21st). Instead, a Deanery 6 Strove Tuesday was celebrated at St John's in La Verne.

Feb. 22, 2023 Ash Wednesday was the coldest Ash Wednesday since Ash & Dash began. Celebrants from St. Mark's imposed ashes on over 150 people coming in almost 120 vehicles – including two trash collections trucks.

During Lent, the Acolyte program was resurrected. An acolyte training was held later in the year on December 3rd. Thank you to all the acolytes that served this year.

The Deanery 6 rotating Lenten Soup Supper and Book Series resumed for the first time since the COVID pandemic. St. Ambrose Claremont, St. Paul's Pomona, St. John's La Verne, Christ Church Ontario and St. Mark's Upland each participated in one of the 5 Wednesday evenings in March. The program focused on "Spirituality of the Psalms" by Walter Brueggeman.

Again, post-COVID, we resumed the Overnight Prayer Vigil on Maundy Thursday April 6 at St. Mark's. Good Friday Stations of the Cross was held on April 7th at St. Mark's, at 12 noon, and lead by members of the Sancta Sophia chapter of the Order of The Daughters of The King. The Saturday evening Easter Vigil Service was held on April 8th at St. Ambrose in Claremont.

Easter Sunday, April 9th, included annual Easter Egg Hunt on the south lawn. Thank you to our Parking Attendants and Sextons led by Dale Biggs; Ushers and Greeters led by Kimberly Cortner; Eucharistic Ministers led by John Flasher; Lectors led by Greg Hewgill; St. Fiacre (Gardening Guild) and Bread Bakers led by Connie Williams; Oblation Bearers; Altar Guild; Flower Guild led by Christy Hyder; Counters led by Kathy Walker; Digital Ministry led by Bob Mattus; Liturgical Arts led by Canon Serena Beeks; Palm Branch Procurement led by Al and Joseph Montanez; Acolytes and Worship Committee led by Dr. Jim Brown; Sunday School and Fellowship Committee led by Susan Mackall; Hospitality/Coffee Hour/Brunch led by Sharon Muehlbacher, Susan Mackall, Betty Farrell, and Rev. This year's Pentecost service, held on May 30th, included languages in Yoruba, Spanish, French, German, Bahasa, Latin, Haitian Creole, and American Sign Language.

Worship music has always been a strong component of our services. 2023 began with a continuation for a search for a new permanent Music Director. The search committee was led by vestry member Marcia Godwin. Many thanks to those who served as guest organist and pianist in the interim; Marcia Godwin, Sally Monastiere, Dr. Sonia Lee, Rachelle, and Ken Rudolf.

In May 2023 our current music director Lawrence Goddard arrived fresh from New Mexico to begin his tenure here. He has included the Harpsicord in the music ensemble.

Part and parcel to our music is the dedicated members of our choir. In December, the handbell choir provided another inspiring performance.

The St. Mark's Band continued to play on select Sunday's once a month.

They have now formalized a schedule to perform on the first Sunday of each month under the directorship of Jana Garner. Laura and Mike Schinler, Marcia Godwin, Barbara Nalbach, Teresa Gillette, Rob Garretson, Lance and Barbara Farr

Every Sunday service and other special occasions held at St Mark's can be viewed live and recorded through Facebook and YouTube provided by St. Mark's Digital Ministry lead by Bob Mattus.

In July while Rev. Keith was away, Rev Judy Heffron and Rev. Sally Monastiere officiated for Sunday worship. In the beginning of August postulant Julia Warren left to attend Yale Divinity School to begin her seminary education. At the end of August, Rodney B. Hume Dawson,

Ph.D. Rodney completed his Diocesan Discernment Year at St. Mark's. Rodney, himself disabled from childhood polio, led a series of interactive lectures entitled "Love Thy Neighbor: Disability Awareness Forum" earlier in the year and he also gave several inspiring sermons during his visitation. The St. Mark's Discernment Committee did recommend that Rodney continue along in the discernment process.

Thank you to Susan Mackel and Lisa Drew for their unwavering dedication to the Sunday School ministry.

The Deanery 6 rotating Advent Soup Supper and Book Series also resumed for the first time since the COVID pandemic. St. Paul's Pomona, St. John's La Verne and St. Mark's Upland each participated in one of the 3 Wednesday evenings in December. The program focused on "Embracing the Prophets in Contemporary Culture" by Walter Brueggeman.

A mixed Baptism, Confirmation and Reception service was held at St. Mark's on Sunday Dec.10th and was officiated by the Right Rev. C. Franklin Brookhart, Jr., Bishop Assisting of the Episcopal Diocese of Los Angeles. Ginger Rudisill was baptized; Melissa Diaz, Rachel Holbrook, and Joseph Montanez were confirmed; and Sylvia Otsuka was received into this communion.

Sunday Dec. 17th an inter-generational Nativity Pageant was performed under the direction of Susan Mackel. The sanctuary was beautifully decorated for Christmas Season. Christmas Day 2023 was on a Monday; the Christmas Day service was fairly attended, possibly due to Christmas Eve falling on Sunday.

A healthy and robust worship requires all the congregation and parishioners to participate in at least one of the worship ministries: Altar guild, Flower Guild, LEM's, Acolytes, Greeters/Ushers, Lectors, Choir, Band, Bell Choir, Liturgical Arts, Baker's, or Digital Ministry. DIGITAL MINISTRY

Digital Ministry serves approximately 10 to 15 individuals each Sunday that watch the livestream broadcast from a remote location. In 2023, Digital Ministry has livestreamed 54 worship services (52 Sundays and 2 added Worship Services. In addition to the regular 2023 Sunday services, Digital Ministry also livestreamed 2 memorial services and provided audio support for 2 funerals (not live streamed). During one memorial service, Digital Ministry demonstrated the capability to live stream from the Memorial Garden In addition, Digital Ministry added the capability to live stream outdoor activity such as the Palm Sunday outdoor celebration or the chalking of the church doors. For the Sanctuary audio system – two new speakers have been installed in the Narthex and two additional speakers have been installed in the Sanctuary (choir loft). An additional microphone has been installed at the pulpit.

We welcomed two new members: Joel Bolton and Paul Stapp and said goodbye to David Nalbach and Alma Zook. Recruitment and training of Digital Ministry members continues. We are always looking for additional volunteers to support the ministry!

One additional video PTZ camera will be added to the Sanctuary. In addition, TV Screens will be added in the church hall to show pictures of past events and to advertise upcoming events. Additional screens will be added as donations become available.

FLOWER GUILD

The Flower Guild supports the Mission Statement of the Church by welcoming help from all parishioners who wish to donate their time and creative talent. Each year, the Flower Guild takes care of Sunday alter arrangements, several memorial service arrangements, the Advent Wreath, Christmas decorations, flowers for Mother's Day, school graduation service alter flowers, and a Blue Christmas arrangement. Also, we donate plants/flowers to fourteen shut ins twice each year.

It is our goal and desire to have sponsors for altar flowers all 52 weeks of the year. Usually there is a chart in the Parish Hall, and people sign up to honor a birthday, an anniversary, or to have another remembrance listed in the Sunday bulletin. We do not have a chart in the

Parish Hall at this time because many members view services online. So, it is preferred that everyone contact the church office.

When a person signs up to sponsor the altar flowers—to commemorate a special person or event in their lives—we ask that they make a financial donation in the amount of at least \$100 to help cover the cost of the flowers and necessary supplies. Supplies include; oasis, vases, urns, baskets, pedestals, easels, Floral Life, spray bottles, watering cans, floral tape, ribbon, wire, shears, clippers, trash bags, storage containers, buckets, and a broom. We budget very carefully to have funds for all the support supplies and fresh flowers that have become increasingly expensive.

The planter to the west of the doors with the lion topiary is a future project to be planted with clippings from the east succulent garden.

The only requirement for membership in the Flower Guild is a desire to participate in floral arranging and the enjoyment of decorating the church for special services. Additionally, one must be willing to donate time on occasional weekends and have the ability to go to the local wholesale floral supplier to get the flowers, where we have established charge accounts. Any parishioners, male or female individuals or teams, are welcome to join this guild. Newcomers can train with existing guild members. There is no financial cost to be a member of the Flower Guild. We would love to have additional members. Current members of the Flower Guild are Serena Beaks, Natalie Dunlap, Myrna Dole, Kate Flannery, Christy Hyder, Sylvia Ochoa, and Barbara Nalbach.

FOOTHILL FAMILY SHELTER

LITURGICAL ARTS

SANCTA SOPHIA CHAPTER OF THE ORDER OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE KING®

Two of our members are officers of the Los Angeles Diocesan Board of the Daughters of the King – Kimberly Cortner, President and Carol Morgan, Secretary – and several members represented our chapter at both the Spring and Fall Diocesan Assemblies.

Most of our members are active in a variety of ministries within and beyond St. Mark's. Our chapter service to the St. Mark's community includes maintaining the St. Mark's parish prayer list, which is updated regularly. Daughters include this list in their daily individual prayers and those who are able also meet every Thursday morning via Zoom to pray through the list. In October we sent hand-written letters to the families of St. Mark's members who had passed away since All Saints' Day 2022 and Daughters read the names of deceased loved ones as part of the service on All Saints' Sunday 2023. We provided healing prayer following the Eucharist on the second Sunday of each month and facilitated five parish donation drives for the Foothill Family Shelter. These drives resulted in total donations of 304 separate food and beverage items, 429 personal hygiene items for men, women, and children, 522 school supply items, 50 miscellaneous items, and 23 completed Thanksgiving baskets. We wish to thank all in the St. Mark's parish for their continuing and generous support of our ministries.

TOUCH MINISTRIES

The collected weekly donations to this ministry are taken to Ontario each Tuesday morning to a storage area rented from Fortress Church. Items included throughout the year, and very much appreciated, are: fast food GCs, hygiene supplies [toothbrushes/paste, bars of soap, sanitary items, deodorant, etc], tee shirts, rain ponchos, sox, gloves, warm hats, gently used clothing for men and women. Food items are also donated throughout the year. These include cup-a-soups [lightweight but generally easily filled with the necessary hot water at various venues], small tins of tuna fish, 'meat sticks' [Vienna sausage type items], jars of peanut butter, all good items to provide protein. Some foods from other groups have included fruits and vegetables that also get handed out 5 mornings a week.

Twice a year a sit-down, served meal is provided, generally around Easter and around Christmas, though not on the actual days. St Mark folks have helped with these by being setup, serve, and cleanup participants. Connie Anaya, the founder of T.O.U.C.H., always is thankful for what St Mark's provides through material donations, checks directly to T.O.U.C.H. to help cover its expenses [rent for the storage of above, gas for the truck used to pick up donated items of food, occasional bikes, clothing] as well as personal presence. At those

meals gently used or new donated clothing is also set out for clients to choose from. Generally there are more men than women and there is at this time one family with 2 young children.
